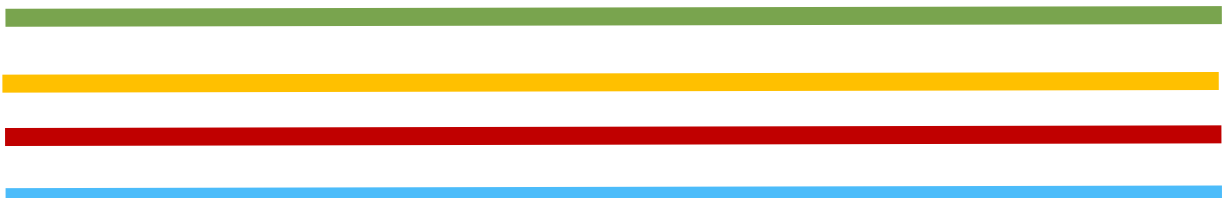

Why complete the Advanced Certificate in Systemic Family Therapy and Practice?

Phoenix Family Therapy Academic operates in line with contemporary practice, taking a multi-positioned perspective, drawing on theory and practice from across the evolution of family therapy including first, second and third generation approaches, and contemporary practice including considerations of Neuroscience, Evidence-Based Practice, Trauma Informed Care and Integrative Practice.

This philosophy is based on integrative practice principles and acknowledges the significant contribution of different approaches to family therapy across time and the benefit of multiple perspectives in finding manoeuvrability in effectively supporting clients.

In the Advanced Certificate in Systemic Family Therapy and Practice participants will:

- Be thoroughly grounded in Systems Theory in order to develop and refine their ability to 'think systemically'
- Develop knowledge and skills in a variety of First and Second Generation schools of Family Therapy, including core principles, frameworks and philosophies
 - First Generation: Understanding and changing patterns of behaviour and structures, and beliefs that hold these in place
 - Second Generation: Understanding and working with meaning making, context, relationships and language
- Learn a meta-framework for integrative practice and knowledge and skills for working systemically with trauma in line with Third Generation approaches to Family Therapy in order to provide effective, individualised interventions.
 - Third Generation: Integrative practice across schools of family therapy and with other psychotherapeutic approaches and paradigms e.g., neurobiology, trauma
- Explicitly link theory to practice

The Advanced Certificate in Systemic Family Therapy and Practice offers a unique opportunity to develop the capacity to use Systemic Family Therapy principles and practices in a wide range of settings with families, couples, individuals (Children, Adolescents, Adults), stakeholder groups, teams and organisations.

This program incorporates adult learning principles and has a large experiential component including experiential workshops, systemic group supervision, live supervision, and advanced workshops, as well as a structured reading group and as such is open to both local and distance students.

What's in a name?

The Phoenix Family Therapy Academy's Advanced Certificate is called "Systemic Family Therapy and Practice" to highlight:

A focus on the underlying concepts and foundations of family therapy to encapsulate that this is a framework for practice regardless of who the client is. As a framework for practice the focus is on how you think about and work with whoever the client is. This means a systemic framework can be used with an individual of any age, a couple or other dyadic constellation (e.g., a young person in residential care and a key worker, two adult siblings, a parent and child), a family of any constellation, a group of stakeholders who work together, a team, or even an organisation. Systemic thinking is also helpful for organisational consultancy and community work.

Entry Requirements

Pre-requisites

An appropriate degree in health, counselling, social work, teaching, or related discipline and the completion of at least 1 year of work experience in the helping profession.

Process

Applications will be received and assessed through the following process:

Step One

Email Phoenix Family Therapy Academy (phoenixftacademy@gmail.com) an expression of interest in the program and include as an attachment a CV and a referee (does not have to be a Family Therapist; must be someone who knows the applicant's work).

Step Two

A phone call will be offered with the Director of Phoenix to discuss the program, questions the applicant may have

Step Three

An orientation interview will occur with the Director to discuss the program content and process, and suitability of the program for the applicant – professional goals, time commitment and financial guidelines.

Program Requirements

To complete the Advanced Certificate in Systemic Family Therapy and Practice the participant must meet these requirements:

- Completion of the 8 courses (two courses per semester).
- A pass mark of at least 50% for each course.
- A minimum attendance requirement of 90% with make-up tasks completed as necessary. Make up tasks are used for example, if participants take “sick leave”, “family leave”, or “other leave” and are unable to meet the 90% attendance.
 - The tutorials require a minimum of 6 of 7 tutorials per semester
 - The systemic group supervisions require a minimum of 6 of 7 supervisions per semester
 - The reading program requires a minimum of 11 of 13 reading journals per semester
 - Workshops require a minimum of 3 of 4 workshops per semester in first year, and 4 of 5 workshops per semester in second year
 - Participants will be supported with individualised plans accommodating their circumstances to meet the 90% attendance criteria

Contact Hours and Requirements:

Policy Statement

- A learning environment that is free from harassment, discrimination or bullying, that considers each person's unique circumstances, and that welcomes diversity.

Complaints and Grievance Resolution Process

Grievance resolution will be guided by the following resolution process:

1. The grievance will be addressed as expeditiously as possible.
2. The resolution of the participant grievance will be managed as close as possible to the source of course participant dissatisfaction and as informally as possible e.g., participants will be encouraged to speak with the staff member most closely involved in the grievance.
3. The course participant is entitled to appeal to the Director (the most senior decision maker) with any new or additional information to support their grievance, or they can explain why the original decision did not comply with Phoenix policies and discuss the policies with the Director.
4. The enrolment of the course participant will be maintained during the grievance process.
5. There will be no reprisal as a result of lodging a complaint, grievance or appeal for the course participant.
6. If an interview with the course participant and a Director is required, the participant may bring a support person (who is not a legal representative, or currently a practicing solicitor or barrister).
7. The Phoenix grievance process promotes the principles of procedural fairness and natural justice.
8. This process of supporting Grievances will be widely publicised to facilitate access to the grievance resolution process.
9. A course participant may choose to have their grievance reviewed by an external complaint handling process e.g., the Australian Association of Family Therapy.

Professional Memberships

Graduates of the Advanced Certificate in Systemic Family Therapy and Practice may be eligible for membership with the Australian Association of Family Therapy (AAFT) upon completion of the Membership requirements.

The Australian Association of Family Therapy is national organisation and peak body for family therapists in Australia. AAFT offers the only available pathway to accreditation of family therapy courses in Australia.

The Advanced Certificate in Systemic Family Therapy Program complies with the AAFT Core Content areas:

- An overview of the history of the development of family therapy.
- Developmental stages of family life.
- Clinical practice to specific client populations including for instance: children, adolescents, and elderly.
- Socio political influences.
- Models of assessment and intervention.
- Referral and referral options.
- Ethics of clinical practice and supervision.
- Theories and processes of family therapy.
- Integrating and understanding human diversity including culture, gender, age, ability, class, religion and ethnicity.
- Further development of self-awareness.
- Familiarity with research on effectiveness of family therapy.

This training includes a component relating to the Self of the Therapist (family of origin and contextual influences) across both first and second year with the depth of exploration deepening in the second year, and an ongoing consideration throughout the program
